# Clarification on County Police for NJ or PA Elected Officials

Counties <u>Should Not</u> be setting up another County Police Force when they already have <u>an existing</u> <u>County Police Force</u> called the Sheriff's Office (see <u>County Police vs.</u> <u>the Elected Sheriff</u> on the NJIAT website)

Counties <u>should not be setting up a county police force</u> when they already have an existing county police force called the <u>Sheriff's Office</u>. This is a <u>duplication of</u> <u>services</u> and is contrary to the philosophy of <u>Shared</u> <u>Services</u>. A county police separate from the Sheriff's Office is very costly (most Sheriffs' Offices are under Civil Service that seeks to curb political favoritism and base hiring and promotion on merit). The **Sheriff** is directly **accountable** to the people because he or she is **elected** and thus more sensitive to **citizens' rights**.

## See Examples below of What Functions a Sheriff's Office Performs:

**Essex County** transferred their Essex County Division of Police to the **Essex County Sheriff's Office** in 1997. Why? Because you already have a county police force through the Sheriff's Office and it was a duplication of services. **Essex County Sheriff's Office** also runs **Homeland Security** (the Sheriff appointed a former **FBI** Assistant Special Agent in Charge as Director of this unit), **the Park System**, **Bomb Squad**, **Emergency Management**, **Patrol Division**, **Detective Division**, etc. This is the case with many of the bigger Sheriffs' Offices in New Jersey and around the country.

# Also, see <u>Passaic County Sheriff's Office (NJ)</u> & <u>Montgomery County Sheriff's Office (PA)</u>.

Essex County Sheriff's Office also has a Volunteer Deputy Reserve unit—the fully certified Sheriff's Officers donate 20 hours a month to perform law enforcement duties. Yes, these Volunteer Deputies could be used for school security with very little cost to the taxpayers if all the county Sheriffs' Offices in New Jersey implement this program (the Sheriff has jurisdiction in the whole county). [Many Volunteer Deputies recruited are active or retired government personnel and can be used to supplement township Police Departments at a very low cost--see (http://www.essexsheriff.com/index.php?option=com\_co ntent&task=view&id=13&Itemid=22)].



New Jersey and Pennsylvania Townships have two options for their Police Departments:

- 1. The township can <u>keep their police</u> <u>department</u> and just reduce their force through attrition. If the township needs <u>supplemental</u> coverage, they can contract out with the Sheriff's Office.
- 2. The township can <u>merge their police</u> <u>department</u> into the Sheriff's Office on a contractual basis (this would prevent townships who do not want to use the Sheriff's Office from being penalized financially, especially if they are using the <u>State Police</u>. There would still be satellite offices in the respective townships if the Sheriff's Office is used.

# **Proposed Police Mergers In Somerset County Not Cost Effective unless Done thru the Sheriff's Office**

## Police Mergers are not Cost Effective unless it is done through the Sheriff's Office.

Why does the Somerset County (or any other county in NJ), Prosecutor and Freeholders want to establish a <u>high cost county police force</u> when every county in NJ already has a <u>cost efficient county law enforcement</u> <u>agency</u> established under the **State Constitution** called the **Sheriff's Office**?

Any Township Police Mergers should be done through the Sheriff's Office. Creating another county police force is not only stupid, but is a duplication of services which already exists through the Sheriff's Office (an existing county police force) and would be very costly like Nassau County in Long Island and Bergen County in NJ. The people can elect the Sheriff unlike a county police force, which is not accountable to the people (see County Police vs. Elected Sheriff Topic 4 at http://www.njiat.com/local-government.html). Also, the Sheriff's Office is the most cost effective—this has been admitted by the Hunterdon County Shared Services Coordinator in 2010 and supported by many high ranking NJ State Police, other law enforcement personnel and military officers—see National Sheriffs' Association, Sheriff's Association of New Jersey & PA Sheriffs' Association.

## Mergers of Individual Twp. Police Departments on a Contractual Basis with the Sheriff's Office

Mergers of individual Twp. police departments could be done on a <u>contractual basis</u> with the Sheriff's Office or the Sheriff's Office can <u>supplement</u> local Twp. police departments thereby allowing the township to reduce the force through attrition. This would be done on a contractual basis with each township; in other words, <u>each township would pay for their own cost</u> and would determine how many Sheriffs' Officers they want to contract out for. <u>Essex County Sheriff's Office</u> helps supplement local Twp. police departments. Essex County Sheriff's Office has a **Reserve Deputy Program** (20 hours are donated each month by the Reserve Deputies, who are fully certified).

There is a lot of pressure being put on the Somerset County Sheriff to <u>keep his mouth shut</u>—this happened to the previous Somerset County Sheriff when he suggested any Twp. police mergers go through his office and actually save the taxpayers' money.

The Proposal has more to do with the Freeholders and the Somerset County Prosecutor having control, not public safety or saving the taxpayers money. This was admitted by a former Somerset County Freeholder, who is an Assemblyman, to a county committee person at a political event in Hunterdon County. This is <u>very shameful</u>, a disregard for the <u>Constitution</u> and a breach of their <u>fiduciary responsibility</u> to the taxpayers. If the taxpayers want to save money, use the Sheriff's Office!
